Background

This study was commissioned by the Colorado Department of Education's (CDE) Center for At-Risk Education (CARE) to learn about adult and family literacy activities taking place in Colorado's public libraries. In the past there was federal funding available through the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) for public library literacy activities. CARE wanted to learn how the loss of this federal funding has affected the library literacy community in the long term. CARE also initiated this study to update its database of literacy programs in Colorado. It will use the information to network with public libraries about new programs and opportunities and to increase awareness of the role of libraries in adult education and family literacy activities.

Study Participants

Participants in the study were identified using questions on the 2002


Public Library Annual Report. All libraries filling out this mandatory report were asked:

How many of the following types of programs were offered by the library during the past year, and how involved is the library in each type of the programming compared to the previous year? On these questions answer: more, same, less, or not offered.

- After-school events to improve academic achievement of K-12 students.
- Reading promotion events attended by/held at day care centers.
- Adult literacy programs.
- Family literacy programs (i.e., involving children and parents together).

Out of a total of 115 public libraries in Colorado, 64 replied "more", "same", or "less" for their 2002 adult or family literacy programs. These libraries were sent a follow-up survey by mail in late July 2003. The follow-up survey asked details about the type of programs offered, frequency, numbers of participants, funding sources, level and type of library involvement, and more.

The response rate for the survey was very good—over 78 percent (50 of 64 libraries) responded. Of those 50 responses, 12 were from libraries that do not currently have family or adult literacy activities. Ten had answered the question on the 2002 Colorado Public Library Annual Report incorrectly, 1 had recently ended library involvement in literacy activities, and 1 library's literacy program had just become independent. When the survey closed after one month, there were 38 completed questionnaires to analyze representing 33 percent of Colorado public libraries. Chart 1 illustrates these numbers.



Findings

Adult and family literacy programs offered in Colorado's public libraries vary widely in size, activities, sources of funding, and partner organizations. Each program reflects unique community needs and responses to those needs.

Eleven of the 12 Colorado public library jurisdictions that serve populations of over 100,000 people offer literacy activities. But literacy activities are offered by public libraries of all sizes. Table 1 shows the number of public libraries in different population categories that offer adult and/or family literacy activities. The libraries in resort communities are considered in a separate group and not with their library service area population groups because of their similarities to each other and differences from other public libraries. As the percentage column in the table indicates, the group of public libraries serving populations of over 100,000 has the highest percentage with adult and/or family literacy activities. This may be because the diverse populations in the bigger communities have both greater need for literacy activities and the resources to offer them. The group with the next highest percentage of public libraries offering literacy activities is in resort communities, possibly due to the need for literacy activities among low-wage workers in these communities.



Size of library service population does not always correspond to number of participants in a library's literacy activities. The survey asked respondents to estimate how many people participate in adult and/or family literacy activities in their libraries each month. Table 2 indicates that some of the larger libraries offer programs that reach only a small number of people while some smaller libraries offer programs that reach many people. The data shows the unique nature of public library literacy programs. Public libraries strive to meet community needs and not all communities have similar needs for adult and family literacy activities.

Libraries partner with many different kinds of organizations to offer adult and family literacy activities. School districts, colleges or universities, and community-based literacy programs are often literacy program partners for survey respondents. But libraries have many other partners, another




indication of how each literacy program is a unique response to community needs. One library partners with workforce centers and probation departments.

"The Fort Morgan Public Library in partnership with the Morgan Community College [provides] a family literacy program during the school year. The program began as an outreach program and it was all done at the Morgan Community College ABLE Center. It has now progressed and we meet at the library every other Monday. This helps the children and their parents feel comfortable in a library setting."


Ofelia Acevedo Fort Morgan Public Library Another partners with a pediatric medical practice. Others mentioned preschool programs, both public and private. Only 4 respondents said their libraries did not partner with any other organizations to offer their literacy activities. Chart 2 illustrates

the number of libraries partnering with various kinds of organizations for literacy activities. More details can be found in Appendix B.


The responding libraries contribute different kinds of resources to the literacy programs they offer. Some are able to contribute paid library staff, volunteers, funds, library facilities, and special materials collections for literacy activities. Some libraries contribute only some of those resources. Chart 3 illustrates which of the resources responding public libraries contribute to literacy activities. As seen in the chart, the most common contribution is collections of materials for literacy students followed by library facilities and paid library staff. Some of the contributions named in the "Other" category include office supplies, free books for children, and a staff member to serve on the advisory board.



Paid library staff has primary responsibility for the literacy activities in most of the public libraries in the study. Volunteers are primarily responsible for the literacy activities at only four of the responding libraries. Education professionals have primary responsibility for literacy activities at two of the libraries. At the remaining six libraries primary responsibilities are shared between paid library staff and education professionals or volunteers. Chart 4 illustrates this data.



Funding sources for the literacy programs also vary widely. Local government is the most common source of funding, but many library literacy programs have more than one source of funding. Chart 5 shows the number of libraries using specified funding sources for their literacy activities. The "Other" category includes funding from businesses, individuals, foundations, and corporations. Appendix B gives information about the funding sources for programs at individual libraries.



Libraries are offering a wide variety of literacy activities for both adults and families. Adult programs offered include English as a Second Language (ESL)

activities, programs for adult new readers, GED test preparation, citizenship classes, and tours and information tailored for adult learners. Family literacy activities include outreach to

day care centers, reading activities in which parents and children interact, programs to teach parents about how children develop and learn to read, and programs to show parents how to help their children enjoy reading. Table 3 shows the types and frequency of activities offered. The table indicates a wide variety of activities offered by libraries in response to community needs. In general, the only literacy activity offered by many libraries on a daily basis is library information for ESL/Adult learners. Family literacy activities such as outreach to day care centers, parent-child reading activities, and programs for parents on how to help children read are offered by many libraries on a weekly basis. Formal GED preparation, citizenship classes, and adult learner book clubs are not offered in the majority of the responding libraries, but they are offered in some libraries in response to local needs and interests.

Most of the libraries responding to the survey had special collections of materials for students in adult and family literacy programs. Some of the libraries

offer many different kinds of literacy
materials while others have more
targeted collections. In many cases a
broader range of materials for literacy
students is offered than actual literacy
activities. For example, 27 responding
libraries have GED preparation
materials, but only 16 said they offer

GED activities in their libraries. 34 libraries have ESL materials available, but only 24 have ESL activities. Some of the materials mentioned in the "Other"

category included cable television programming, games, flash cards, and subscription databases. Table 4 summarizes the survey findings about library collections for literacy students. Appendix B gives details about the types of collections for literacy students offered by the individual libraries.

There are many ways that individuals associated with the responding public libraries contribute to literacy activities for adults and families, activities that are associated with the library and literacy activities that are sponsored by others and occur outside the library. Some write proposals to obtain funding for literacy activities while others plan or schedule activities. Some library staff and volunteers recruit participants and others actually tutor or teach. Table 5 summarizes the survey findings about the ways paid library staff and library volunteers are involved in adult and family literacy activities.

programs are put together by library staff or community members using many different resources to respond to local needs. Public libraries are successfully helping to serve adults and families in Colorado who need literacy programs. However, the study did learn that some libraries will have to consider cutting literacy programs if their budget situations do not improve.
