What is child support?

Child support is an amount of money the court orders the parent without custody of the child to pay the parent, relative, or guardian who does have custody. This money is to be used to care for the child.

What information is needed to collect child support?

Obtain as much of the following information as possible about the non-custodial parent from whom you are seeking support:

- social security number;
- date of birth;
- address;
- name and address of employer; and
- bank account number

Where can you find this information?

- state and federal tax returns
- unemployment records
- hospital and medical records
- pay stubs
- military records
- insurance policies

Is it possible to collect child support on your own?

Yes. Collecting child support without assistance may be difficult; however, the court's clerk has a packet of forms that may help you to consider your options and you can get the forms from the court's web site under "child support worksheets." In addition, each county department of social services has a child support enforcement program that can help you find the absent parent, establish and enforce child support court orders, and collect child support payments.

What is the Child Support Enforcement Program?

This program was established to help locate absent parents and enforce their obligations to pay child support. The Child Support Enforcement Unit in your county provides the following services:

- location of the other parent(s) and their assets;
- establishment of paternity;
- establishment and modification of a child support order, including medical support;
- enforcement of a child support order, including medical support and spousal maintenance when combined with child support in the order;
- collection of child support payments;
- distribution of payments though a central payment registry, called the Family Support Registry.

There is a one-time application fee of \$20 that may be waived in some cases of hardship. Any parent with minor children who needs or is owed child support can apply for child support enforcement services. The phone number for the enforcement unit in your county is printed on the back of this brochure.

How does the Child Support Enforcement Program locate an absent parent?

The Child Support Enforcement Program will attempt to find the absent parent through various federal, state, and local agencies, such as:

- Social Security Administration
- Internal Revenue Service
- Colorado Department of Labor and Employment
- Colorado Division of Motor Vehicles
- Veterans Administration

What actions may the Child Support Enforcement Unit take in order to collect child support?

- income withholding
- driver's license suspension
- garnishment of wages and bank accounts
- interception of federal and state income tax refunds
- interception of unemployment compensation benefits
- interception of lottery winnings
- assignment of workers' compensation benefits
- liens placed on personal and real property
- notification of child support debts to consumer reporting agencies
- professional, occupational, and recreational license suspension
- new hire reporting
